## Parish fights mosquito infestation with heavy spraying throughout Oct.

Mosquito control operations have been ramped up since September 20. While the parish received little

rainfall from Hurricane Ida, Tropical Storm Nicholas inundated the area with 8-10 inches of rain.

This was more than enough rain to begin a major hatch off of floodwater mosquito species. They are voracious biters and breed in extremely high numbers, which led to numerous mosquito complaint calls.

Parish-wide spray truck operations have continued through October, with the entire parish being sprayed 2-3 times each week. Surveillance traps were placed out in mid-October to re-evaluate floodwater mosquito population levels and the need for continued parish-wide spraying.

Regardless of whether parish-wide spray truck operations continue, weekly spraying of all parish

parks and schools will continue into November. The parish will also be sprayed again in advance of Halloween Trick-or-Treat festivities on October 31.

Southern house mosquito (the mosquito species that carries West Nile Virus) population

numbers and West Nile Virus activity is down. West Baton Rouge has had 26 West Nile positive mosquito samples out of 836 samples tested, and zero human cases.

"We encourage everyone to continue to take precautions," said Mosquito Superintendent George Bragg. "Use mosquito repellent. Eliminate standing water, and empty all containers around the home at least once per week. Larvicide tablets and granules for problematic containers or standing water areas can be obtained free of charge by WBR Parish residents at our office."

## New early voting location set for Nov. election

West Baton Rouge voters will now have two early voting locations for the November 13 election:

- The Registrar of Voters office in the Courthouse Annex Building, 883 7th Street, Suite A, Port Allen.
- The Early Voting building at 158 East St. Francis Street in Brusly. This is a new early voting location and is the old parish water/gas office in Brusly. It will be used for early voting only. It is not an election day precinct.

Early voting is Oct. 30 through Nov. 6, excluding Sunday, Oct. 31. Hours are 8:30 am to 6 pm. Parish voters will have four constitutional amendments on the ballot.

The building in Brusly has been remodeled and made handicapped accessible to accommodate early voting.

"More than ever, people are voting early. This new location will be available for all West Baton Rouge Parish residents, and will give early voters who work or live on the southern end of the parish a place to vote early without fighting the traffic surrounding the Intracoastal Bridge," said Parish President Riley "PeeWee" Berthelot.

Parish utility customers will still be able to drop their utility payments into the drop box located outside the building year-round.

## Joliet Trail project going out for bids

The parish's Joliet Trail project, which will provide a walking and biking trail from Alexander Park to the base of the Mississippi River levee, will go out for bids before the end of the year. The path is part of the parish's extensive walking and biking trail system that has been constructed in phases over the last 6 years.

The path will extend from the park to West St. Francis Street to the River Road and then along the base of the levee. The parish has also been approved for two other trails for construction in the upcoming years: a trail in the Choctaw Road area with possible links to Alexander Park in Brusly, and another along Court Street in Port Allen to improve the tourism walking system. The Acadian Trail in Addis, which is similar to the Joliet Trail in Brusly, is also slated for construction in the next couple of years.

### OTHER PARISH PROJECTS:

The parish's \$1.58 million road improvement program for 2021 is nearing completion. The program included construction of the extension of La. Hwy. 415 and Commercial Drive, and the extension of Freeman Lane. Overlays included Rougon Road, Airline Park Drive, Airline Park Drive West, Parkland Drive, Parkland Drive South, North and South Palmer, Blain Street, Rene Street, Famco Road, Laws Road, and Babytown Lane.

The Andre Lane water line is being upgraded. Approximately 1,800 feet of 4 inch pipeline is being replaced with 8 inch pipeline to improve water pressure. This was funded with a state CWF grant.


The screens for the Lukeville water treatment plant are being replaced, and three generators are being added to sewer system lift stations along Cohn Road. Both of these projects are funded by LGAP grants.

## Port City ramps up help for disabled

Port City Enterprises, a Port Allen-based service provider for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, has hired a new director and is taking steps to re-brand and expand services. Susanne Romig, native and resident of Brusly, has been appointed as the new Executive Director and will implement a plan to address the area's shortage of resources for individuals with special needs and their families.

The announcement was made by Judge William Kleinpeter, Board President for Port City Enterprises. Romig served since 2018 as Executive Director of The Arc Baton Rouge. Romig noted that the numbers of students obtaining an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and enrolled in special education classes in WBR has risen ten-fold in recent years, and many of them have autism and related behavioral diagnoses.

Port City Enterprises offers vocational and supported employment services, adult day hab, respite care and supervised independent living. Through a new partnership with Louisiana Rehabilitation Services (LRS) and local high schools, Port City will provide school to community transition classes which help students enrolled in special ed to prepare for life after high school. ## Answering the call to house linemen

An idea by Port Allen resident Rhonda Coye to house electrical linemen after Hurricane Ida quickly became a reality once the West Baton Rouge community pitched in. Within one day the parish jumped in to offer the Addis Community Center to house the linemen, and residents, organizations and businesses jumped in with a huge outpouring of supplies and food for the linemen.

Approximately 35 to 40 linemen from across the country stayed at the Community Center each night for a week in early September. They slept on cots and air mattresses, and were provided all meals, along with other toiletries and supplies and laundry service! The parish provided them with a meal of jambalaya the first night the center was open.

"We heard that linemen were sleeping in their vehicles and we wanted to help them, and show these linemen some Cajun hospitality and our appreciation for being here to get electrical power back on," Coye said. She served as coordinator with a core committee, but she was quick to say, "It was a real community effort. We had so much donated, we had to stop taking donations, but everything that was left over went to the hurricane victims."

"The linemen were so appreciative of everything we did," she said. "They were taking pictures to send to their families, raving about the food, and so many thanked us as much as we thanked them!" Thanks to all who contributed and volunteered for this effort!

## Gearing up for Halloween weekend

The West Baton Rouge Sheriff's Office is planning extra patrols for Halloween weekend, and also will be conducting monitor checks of all sex offenders in the parish to help keep children safe as they enjoy trick-or-treat and other Halloween activities. Trick-or-treat hours throughout the parish are from 5:30 until 7:30 pm on Sunday, October 31.

Sheriff Cazes urged parents to watch their children carefully at Halloween, and to follow these safety tips for kids 12 and under:

- Always go trick-or-treating with an adult
- Know how to call 911 in case they get lost
- Know their parent's cell phone number
- Walk on sidewalks on lit streets (never through alleys or across lawns)
- Walk from house to house (never run) and always walk facing traffic when walking on roads
- When crossing the street, never assume that vehicles will stop. Wait for them to fully stop.
- Have flashlights with fresh batteries or wear glow sticks as bracelets or necklaces.
- Parents should limit trick-or-treating to your neighborhood and the homes of people you know.



# Don't flush your disposable wipes!

Disposable wipes — used for changing diapers, personal hygiene, housecleaning, and more — cause major problems when flushed down toilets. Because they don't break down the way toilet paper does, these wipes clog homeowner and municipal sewer pipes, put stress on community wastewater collection and treatment equipment, and cause towns to spend thousands on premature equipment repair and replacement.



The photo above shows two glasses with water. At left, toilet paper is dissolved after 8 days, while on the right, wipes have not dissolved at all after 8 days.

Wipes snag on any imperfection in sewer pipes, catch passing debris and grease, and create a "ball" that will grow to plug the pipe. They also get drawn into sewer-line and wastewater treatment plant pumps and clog and damage them, and must be manually cleared out of pumps.

Although many brands of disposable wipes are labeled "flushable," don't flush them! The clogs and backups they cause may result in expensive plumbing bills for your home, or issues and expenses for the Town of Addis. The resources wastewater facilities expend on wipes could be better spent on systems to improve water quality. Put your wipes in the trash - it matters more than you realize!



The historic Union Pacific Big Boy steam locomotive, built in 1941, made a stop in Addis on Aug. 22 as part of its US tour. Only 25 of these locomotives were built, each 132 feet long and weighing 1.2 million pounds. Big Boy No. 4014 was retired in December 1961, having traveled 1,031,205 miles in its 20 years in service. Union Pacific reacquired No. 4014 in 2013, and relocated it back to Cheyenne to begin a multi-year restoration process. It returned to service in May 2019 to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the Transcontinental Railroad's Completion.

# Construction of St. James Square begins in November

Construction on the new St. James Square at the levee and East Main Street will begin in November, now that the contract has been signed with Kelly Construction for the project.

The park ties in to the Mississippi River levee walking and biking trail entrance at Brusly, and provides a pavilion that will include a covered stage area, the town's bike share racks, restrooms, and water fountains.

In addition, it has a small pavilion surrounded by trees, green space, water features, landscaping, lighting, and area for food trucks to park for events.

One of the most unique aspects of the park is the "Legacy Walk," in which walkers can scan icons on the walkway with their cell phones, and learn about the town's history. The town is closing part of Bourg Street as part of this project.

## Park fitness station complete, ready for use

### SEWER SYSTEM WORK CONTINUES...

The City has completed the repairs to the Eighth Street manhole and sewer lines at California Avenue by replacing a 26-year old sump pump that failed. The replacement had to be special ordered.

In addition, the City is completing the final installations of the three new effluent pumps, which will be used to discharge our treated wastewater into the Mississippi River. The sludge pumps for the wastewater system have now been rebuilt and they are fully operational.

"We are continuing to improve the functionality of the wastewater plant with the help of some of the \$1.6 million in American Rescue Plan funding," said Mayor Richard Lee. "We are making steady progress on the extensive sewer system work needed in the city."

# Recapping 2021 - Record increase in assessed values



West Baton Rouge Parish will see its largest ever year to year increase in assessed property values in 2021, \$72.9 million. "The increase in values is due in large part to 2020 real estate value increases that were postponed to 2021 and a large Industrial Tax Exemption Program (ITEP) contract that became taxable in 2021 as business personal property," said Assessor Chris Guerin in the WBR Parish Assessor's Office annual property assessment report.

The total assessed value of real estate increased from \$205 million in 2020 to \$238.7 million in 2021. As noted earlier, there was a large ITEP contract that became taxable and accounted for a large portion of the business personal property (inventory, business furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment) increase from \$305.7 million in 2020 to \$344.9 million in 2021. Also, the value of public service properties decreased from \$49.59 million in 2020 to \$49.38 million in 2021.

Guerin noted that 81.5% of all property taxes paid in West Baton Rouge Parish are paid by business and industry. Additionally, the parish has approximately \$1.7 billion in industrial property exemptions that will be phased onto the assessment rolls by 2029. "These are exemptions the Louisiana Economic Development Office granted for new manufacturing businesses and existing manufacturing business expansions," Guerin said.

Property owners can expect to see the parish wide property tax rate for 2021 decrease from 108.32 mills to 107.25 mills. The rate reduction is a result of the Parish Council decreasing rates by 0.12 mills, the School Board decreasing rates by 2.3 mills and the Assessor's Office levying only 1.35 mills of its constitutional 2.47 mills. However, even with a property tax rate decrease, property taxes for property owners will increase in 2021 because real estate assessed values were reduced by 10% in 2020 as a COVID relief measure as mentioned in the beginning of this article.

The addition of the custom-made stacker is another component of the Port's recent expansion of its successful container operations including a container storage yard totaling 4 acres.

## School board one of first in state to bring wifi capability to students

The West Baton Rouge School Board is blazing the trail for other school systems in Louisiana with a unique initiative to provide wifi access to students at or near their homes.

"When we moved to remote education during COVID, we provided every student in grades 4 through 12 with chromebook laptops, but we realized quickly that a portion of our student population did not have access to the internet," said Tammy Seneca, Supervisor of Information Systems and Educational Technology.

"We are trying to close this digital divide by providing Cradlepoints in strategic locations in the parish," she explained. "The Cradlepoints are like hotspots where students can get wifi to complete homework assignments, but Cradlepoints provide features that are needed when students are involved."

While the students can get internet access, the Cradlepoints have a content filter so that they cannot be used except by WBR Parish students with the Chromebooks, and the students will have access to only what pertains to their school work on the internet. In addition, they can be easily turned on and off. "They will not be able to access games or movies or other things on the internet," Seneca said. "This is strictly for school work and is an extension of the school system's internal network."

The school district is just beginning to install the Cradlepoints, but the plan calls for a total of 69 to be added to electrical poles in both public areas, such as parks, and in neighborhoods where the parish has a high number of students on the free and reduced lunch program.

While not every neighborhood will have Cradlepoints, it will be accessible to students relatively close to their homes. Parents will be notified as the Cradlepoint locations are added, but Seneca added that updates on new locations will be posted on the school board's social media sites and website.

The project has been a year in the making, and has required a lot of planning and collaboration with other agencies. The technology team working on the project has had to get approval from AT&T and Entergy to mount the Cradlepoints on their poles, and had to involve the La. Public Service

Commission and the parish for aspects of the project.

In addition, the non-profit organization Information Technology Disaster Resource Center (ITDRC) has been instrumental in assisting on this project, both by donating installation equipment and also installing the Cradlepoint units for free. The purchase of the units was funded with federal COVID recovery funds, and the approximately \$60,000 in annual wifi fees will be paid through the school board's technology budget.

"ITDRC has been so helpful to us in this initiative, providing expertise and IT experts to assist us," Seneca said. "We can't thank them enough for their willingness to partner with us and help us."

Seneca credited Garrett Couvillon, Network Administrator, for assisting in this project and also working with AT&T to customize boxes that cover the Cradlepoints and protect them for weather.

"We are very excited to provide this for our students," Seneca said. "As we move into the future, it is very important for the school district to provide the tools that students need to complete school work at home. Teachers can't assign internet homework if the students don't have access. This provides that access."

"A lot of school districts across the state are watching us and waiting to see how this works," Seneca said. "We're the first to put them on utility poles, and we are leading the way on this technology."
